Inspired by the 16th century palaces of Genoa and Turin, the 70 room Italian Renaissance-style villa was designed by architect Richard Morris Hunt who directed an international team of craftsmen and artisans. Completed in 1895, the mansion is situated on a 13 acre estate overlooking a magnificent view of the rugged Atlantic Coastline.

The self-guided audio tour of the mansion provides insight into the life of this fascinating time in American History at your own pace. Time is afforded to browse the mansion's gift shop before returning to the pier.

NEW-004 VANDERBILT'S NEWPORT

Discover Vanderbilt's Newport on this delightful tour that has you visiting two of the grandest mansions ever built in the United States, The Breakers and Marble House.

Commodore Cornelius Vanderbilt (1794-1877) established the Vanderbilt family fortune in steamships and later, in the New York Central Railroad. As the industrial revolution reached its zenith in the late 19th century, the Vanderbilts soon became the wealthiest family in America and chose Newport as their summer playground.

Departing the pier, you will first drive to Marble House. Completed in 1892, Marble House was modeled after the Petit Trianon in Versailles. Mr. Vanderbilt instructed his architect, Richard Morris Hunt to build "the very best living accommodations that money could buy". After nearly four years of work, and a total cost exceeding \$11 million, the mansion was completed in 1892 and given to his wife, Mrs. Alva Vanderbilt, leading hostess of Newport Society, for her 39th birthday. This striking Mansion became the social and architectural landmark that set the pace for Newport's transformation from a quiet summer colony of wooden houses to the legendary resort of opulent stone palaces. You will enjoy the stories of the elaborate parties of the Gilded Age as you tour the public rooms and grounds of Marble House.

Continuing on, you will next visit The Breakers, the grandest of Newport's summer "cottages", The Breakers was commissioned by the Commodore's grandson, Cornelius Vanderbilt II, Chairman and President of the New York Central Railroad. Inspired by the 16th century palaces of Genoa and Turin, the 70 room Italian Renaissance-style villa was designed by architect Richard Morris Hunt who directed an international team of craftsmen and artisans. NEW-005 ROSE ISLAND LIGHTHOUSE & HARBOR CRUISE

During your 50-minute cruise to the Island, your captain will share some of the 350-year history of the 'City-by-the-Sea' and how it earned the title 'Yachting Capital of the World'. First lit in 1870, the lighthouse was lovingly restored to its original turn-of-the-last century ambience in 1993 and remains a classic example of American maritime architecture. Due to its strategic location, Rose Island has been of military importance since the Revolutionary War. Today, it plays an important role as home to a number of migrating birds. A visit to this "living museum" offers insight into a by-gone way of life spent tending the light and raising families in dedicated self-sufficiency.

Following your visit to the lighthouse, you will join your naturalist guide for a leisurely walk before re-boarding your vessel for the return to the pier. Rich in maritime heritage, past and present, a scenic cruise on the bay is an excellent way to appreciate Newport's colonial heritage, yachting history and opulent estates.

Please note: This tour includes approximately 1-hour of walking and/or standing, half of which is along dirt pathways. Your return to the pier has you traveling via the square where Hollywood producer-director Steven Spielberg filmed the movie Amistad in 1997, using the city's most picturesque landmarks.

Boarding your coach at the pier, you will set-off on the drive to Acadia National Park, first passing through the quaint town of Bar Harbor to view some of the charming Victorian mansions built by America's rich and famous at the turn of the 20th century and then making a stop at the Hull's Cove Visitor Center. Upon arrival at Acadia National Park, you will proceed along the 27-mile Park Loop Road taking in spectacular coastal, mountain and forest views.

Next, you will travel along the ocean's edge, passing Sand Beach, Schooner Head Overlook, and the High Seas Estate, a beautiful mansion built by a wealthy gentleman whose wife perished on the Titanic before ever stepping foot in her dream home. At Thunder Hole, a short photo stop will be made where you can see the ocean swells converge against the granite cliffs to create a thunderous roar (If designated bus parking is not available, an alternate photo stop will be made in the park at the tour guide's discretion).

Continuing on, you will pass Otter Cliffs and the gulf of Maine with beautiful views of the off shore islands, as well as travel through pine wood forests and past the Jordon Pond House. A beautiful view of the Penobscot Mountains and Bubbles Hill awaits you at this location and with much of the land donated by John D. Rockefeller. You will also see the romantic stone-cut bridges and evidence of the elaborate carriage trails built by his family at the turn of the century. Home to over 50 species of mammals, keep your eyes peeled for moose, black bear and white tail deer as you make your way around the Park Loop Road. Encompassing the best that Bar Harbor and Mount Desert Island have to offer, this tour includes the beautiful scenery of Acadia National Park and Cadillac Mountain as well as a chance to learn about the fascinating world of the lobster fisherman during a visit to the Lobster Oceanarium.

Starting off from the pier, you will drive towards Thunder Hole via a scenic drive along the historic 27-mile Park Loop Road which takes you along the ocean's edge. After passing Otter Cliff, you will find yourself at Thunder Hole, where the ocean swells converge against the granite cliffs to create a thunderous roar. A short photo stop is made here (if designated bus parking is not available, an alternate photo stop will be made at the tour guide's discretion) before continuing on to the summit of Cadillac Mountain (Weather and traffic/crowd conditions permitting), there will be a photo stop from atop the 1,530-foot Cadillac Mountain, the highest point on North America's eastern seaboard.) to marvel at the 360-degree view of the coast.

Next, you will travel past the High Seas Estate, a beautiful mansion built by a wealthy gentleman whose wife tragically perished on the Titanic before ever stepping foot in her dream home. You will also pass by Sand Beach, Otter Cliffs and Jordon Pond House, the famous restaurant where tea served on the lawn has been a tradition for more than a century. Nearby Eagle Lake holds a wealth of secrets and the open ocean and crashing surf give Acadia its unique personality.

You will also have a visit to the Lobster Oceanarium, where visitors of all ages have the opportunity to see and learn about the lobster industry. As home to Maine's only lobster hatchery, the Oceanarium features an authentic lobster fishing boat display and fascinating, hands-on exhibits. A lobster expert demonstrates, using authentic traps, how these succulent creatures are caught and make their way from the ocean to your dinner table.

Back in Bar Harbor on the campus of the College of the Atlantic, you'll have an opportunity to visit the Turrets Mansion (or similar), one of Bar Harbor's last remaining summer mansions overlooking Frenchman Bay. The Turrets is on the National Register of Historic Places and is a fine example of the opulent lifestyle of the Gilded Age. Your guide is happy to share tales of a by-gone era, when America's wealthiest families made Bar Harbor their summer playground.

Highlighting your tour is a visit to the Looking Glass Restaurant located on the estate grounds formerly owned by Mary Roberts Rinehart, a mystery writer from the turn of the last century. Surrounded by an 8-sided glass wall, the restaurant features a commanding view of Frenchman Bay, Bar Harbor, and your ship at anchor. Relax and enjoy a piece of traditional homemade blueberry pie with coffee or tea before transferring back to the pier where your tour concludes.

Please note: This tour includes a limited amount of leisurely walking, mainly at the guests' discretion during stops. There are some uneven surfaces and the possibility of slippery surfaces under wet conditions. The tour is available to wheelchair guests who have a collapsible wheelchair, are able to make their own way on and off the coach and have an able-bodied companion to assist them. BHB-007 ACADIA NATIONAL PARK & CARRIAGE RIDE

Returning to the stables, you'll rejoin your coach and continue along the Park Loop Road, making your way to the 1530-foot Cadillac Mountain (weather and traffic/crowd conditions permitting), there will be a photo stop from atop the 1,530-foot Cadillac Mountain, the highest point on North America's eastern seaboard.), highest point on North America's Eastern seaboard. With a 360-degree panoramic view, you will see how glaciers carved through the granite cliffs to form a beautiful landscape of lush forest, lakes and valleys. If weather conditions do not permit a stop at Cadillac Mountain, a stop at the Visitors Center will substituted. Afterwards, you'll transfer directly back to the pier where your tour concludes.

As waves crash against granite, learn about the powerful glacial activity that gave the Maine coast its unique identity, the variety of wildlife that abounds, and the flora and fauna that make this such an island paradise. Learn the role that barons such as John D. Rockefeller played in forming the park. Also learn about the fishing industry and the "golden age" of Bar Harbor, when Mount Desert Island was the playground of America's fabulously wealthy.

After an exhilarating hike of approximately 90-minutes, you'll rejoin your van and travel back to the pier.

Please note: Total distance walking on this tour covers approximately 1.5 miles and the walking is conducted at a leisurely pace. Trail surfaces are mostly dirt and gravel pathways. Being that Halifax is the provincial capital of Nova Scotia (New Scotland), your guide will be wearing a kilt while elaborating on all the local attractions and the town's notable history. You will hear wild tales of rum running, privateering and the massive Halifax Explosion of 1917 that nearly leveled the entire city. During your drive, you will also pass Canada's oldest brewery, the gorgeous Public Gardens and Halifax Citadel, a National Historic Site. Following your tour of the city, you will return to the pier where your tour concludes.

Please note: Walking on this tour is mainly at the guests' discretion at the stops. There are some natural surfaces and slight inclines at Fairview Lawn Cemetery to access all gravesites. The Mar, which means "sea" in Spanish, has quite a history herself.

The ship, which has twice circumnavigated the world, was built in Denmark for author Ernest K. Gann, and then sold to Charles Tobias, the founder of Pusser's Rum. Now docked in Halifax, the ship offers harbor tours with a historic flair. If you please, you can help hoist the sails and steer the ship. Or if you prefer, just sit back and enjoy the experience while the crew sails the Mar. They'll even fire her cannon to give you a sense of life at sea in the days of the original tall ships.

The harbor views are simply outstanding in every direction and include historic homes and Canada's east coast naval base. The harbor is also known as the site of the Halifax Explosion of 1917, the world's largest manmade explosion before the atomic bomb was dropped. The massive explosion was caused by two ships colliding; one carrying munitions, and the resulting blast nearly leveled the entire city.

Returning to the dock, the sails will be lowered and you will disembark the ship. Then it's your choice to either walk back to the ship, or stay behind and do some exploring on your own.

Please note: There is a limited amount of walking on this tour and your time aboard the sailing vessel is mostly seated. The tour is available to wheelchair guests who have a collapsible wheelchair (non-motorized), are able to make their own way on and off the vessel, and have an able-bodied companion to assist them. Those with mobility concerns are cautioned to carefully evaluate their personal level of stamina and ability. Individuals who suffer from motion sickness are advised to take necessary precautions prior to boarding the vessel. During your stop, you can shop for specialty merchandise like tartan blankets, jewelry and, of course, the namesake preserves, which include sour cherry marmalade, or perhaps relax in the garden.

Continuing on, you will make your way to nearby Cavendish where you'll see the famed farmstead that inspired the setting for Lucy Maud Montgomery's 1908 classic "Anne of the Green Gables." The touching story about a red-haired orphan that is sent to live on Prince Edward Island has captivated audiences for more than a century. After a leisurely tour of the grounds of the historic site, you will drive into the Prince Edward Island National Park, a wonderland of red sandstone cliffs, expansive beaches and abundant wildlife where a photo stop at one of the park's beaches is included.

Returning to the pier, you will follow a scenic route through mile after mile of pastoral farmland.

Your tour concludes at Founder's Hall and you are then free to either remain in town and do some further exploring on your own, or walk back to the pier.

A conference held in the building in 1864 led to Canada becoming a federation, and Charlottetown became known as the Birthplace of Canada. You will also be able to admire the historic homes lining Great George Street, many of them built in the mid-1800s. Other sites include the Confederation Centre, a hub of cultural excellence and Founder's Hall.

By the time your tour ends back at the pier, you will have gained a fine understanding of the area historically and still have plenty of time to explore further on your own if you like.

In time, you will reach an observation tower that affords a stunning 360-degree view. The large island to the northeast is Anticosti, a Provincial Wildlife Reserve. If it is a clear day and you look south, you may be able to see Bonaventure Island off the coast of Percé.

Toward the end of the hike, you will arrive in Grand-Grave, a restored fishing village with historical homes, barns and exhibits that reflect life here in the 19th century. Some of the buildings are National Historic Sites; the most notable being the Hyman House and Store, which was built with techniques and materials specific to the vernacular neoclassical tradition. After strolling about this historical site, you will board your bus and return to the pier.

Please note: This tour includes 2 1/2 hours of moderate to strenuous walking over mostly even surfaces and covers approximately 3.5 miles in distance. There will be some steps to negotiate. The tour is not available to wheelchair guests or those with mobility concerns. Participants should be in good physical condition. Europeans arrived in 1534 when French explorer Jacques Cartier erected a cross here. He is held in such high esteem that it is almost impossible to escape Cartier's influence and name while in town. In 1934 the city erected a commemorative cross to mark the 400th-anniversary of him setting foot here. There is a Jacques Cartier Monument National Historic Site with sculptures of the first encounter between Cartier and the indigenous people that greeted him. The Gaspé Museum is perched at the tip of Jacques Cartier Point, and much of your heritage walk will be along Rue Jacques Cartier. The explorer is that important to Gaspé.

While strolling through the beautiful downtown, you can also expect to learn about other significant moments in the history of Gaspé. You may see a 19th-century hotel that is now the bishop's residence, a former Neoclassical bank building that has been converted into boutiques, and homes of some of Gaspé's most important settlers, which once housed Brazilian, Italian and Spanish consulates. Following this enlightening walk through Gaspé, you will walk back to the pier.

Please note: This tour includes 2 1/2 hours of easy to moderate walking over uneven surfaces and covers approximately 1 mile in distance. There will be a flight of stairs to negotiate. Its fjord, deeply chiseled in the Laurentian Mountains, is one of the world's largest and was discovered by French explorer Jacques Cartier in the mid 1530s. Arriving at the Fjord Museum, you will discover how the waterway was formed, its importance to the province, and why the museum's strange Ha! Ha! Pyramid monument was created out of more than 3,000 traffic yield signs. Later, you'll walk across the street to the Olivier Soapery, a one-of-a-kind museum devoted to the art and evolution of soap making.

Then, it's on to the Chicoutimi Pulp Mill, a beautiful natural stone mill that has become a museum. Inside, you'll find the Arthur Villeneuve House, which the former owner, a local barber, painted with primitive scenes and figures. Interestingly, including the house in the museum caused a controversy among those who thought it was an eyesore, not art. Finally, you'll visit Le Chevrier du Nord, a farm that raises angora goats for mohair clothing. It's quite the enterprise and a memorable end to your tour before driving back to the pier.

Please note: This tour includes approximately 2-hours of moderate walking/standing. There will be various gradients and surfaces to negotiate, including dirt/gravel paths at Mount Battie. The tour is available to wheelchair guests who have a collapsible wheelchair, are able to make their own way on and off the coach and have an able-bodied companion to assist them. Of course, exactly what you see will vary, although Cape Trinity is known for attracting whales, seals and a variety of marine birds.

After more than an hour on the water, you'll return to the Interpretation Center where you will have some free time to browse in the gift shop before making the transfer back to Saguenay.

Please note: This is an active tour that includes approximately 75-minutes of moderate kayaking. The tour is not available to wheelchair guests or those with mobility concerns. Participants should be in good physical condition. Previous kayaking experience is not required. Weather appropriate, water-resistant clothing and flat, comfortable walking shoes are suggested. Next, it's on to an esteemed Canadian vineyard, where you'll learn about local wine making and sample some of the finest vintages. Because of the harsh winters, Quebec vineyards have rather short growing seasons, but the wines are surprisingly tasty and numerous, and several well-respected varieties are produced here.

After touring the vineyard, you will drive back to the pier, traveling via the bottom of Montmorency Falls where you will have some great views.

At the helicopter complex within the airport, you can test your skills at one of the interactive displays or take the controls of a helicopter in a flight simulator for an additional charge. It's the next best thing to being up in the air, and realistically re-creates the experience. Afterwards, you will transfer back to the pier.

This delightful street with its cafés and specialty shops also features colorful street performers such as jugglers and strolling musicians.

Next, you'll ride the funicular to the Upper Town and walk past many of its landmarks. There's Dufferin Terrace, where Samuel de Champlain built his fort in 1620, historic Ursuline Convent, and Place d'Armes, Upper Town's bustling main square. By now, you should be ready for tea and pastries, and Château Frontenac makes a classic setting for your snack. Sitting on a bluff above the St. Lawrence River, the castle-like hotel has been an icon of Quebec City since opening in 1893. Franklin Delano Roosevelt, Winston Churchill and Mackenzie King, the Prime Minister of Canada during World War II, met here to discuss wartime strategy, and today the hotel still attracts heads of state, dignitaries and celebrities.

Following your refreshing tea break, you will return to the pier where your tour concludes.
